











Joint Migration Policy Roundtable 2020

The integration of migrants, including refugees, in many Member States of the European Union and Associated Countries remains a challenge for both public authorities and local communities.

MIICT, Re-Build, NADINE, MICADO, WELCOME and EasyRights are Horizon 2020-co-funded initiatives who work towards the development of ICT-enabled solutions and toolkits for the implementation of inclusion policies by public administrations. As efficient and effective migrants' integration can only be achieved by clearly understanding the migrants' personal and family situation, but also by involving all key actors, such as researchers, public authorities, civil society organizations and migrants, the 6 projects apply a participatory co-creation approach in the design and provision of tools and services.

In this context, the 6 initiatives, together with their responsible project officers from the Research Executive Academy are hosting a losed Policy Roundtable event, targeted at the six projects consortia, their Expert and Advisory Boards and representatives from the European Commission, to tackle 3 key synergy pillars – the ICT component, the co-creation approach and the role of public authorities and **policy makers** in the delivery of digital public services to the migrants.

Discussion Points

- Digital transformation processes about eGovernment/PAs appear to be heterogeneous, with some countries in EU far behind the average¹. What are the key obstacles and barriers in implementing at local level the principles expressed in the EC Digital Strategy² regarding "Digital solutions for EU-wide public services", the principles of the eGovernment Action Plan 2016-2020 and the Tallinn Ministerial Declaration on eGovernment?
- Which are the best practices on how ICT can help public service delivery to migrants?
- Which policy levels are crucial for boosting the use of ICT for migrant integration and what is the role of EU policy in this context? How can EU, national, regional and local policy makers and authorities as well as NGOs etc. be supported to overcome these challenges? What would be the role of the projects/MS/EU?
- Is there an EU-wide effort for harmonizing skills assessment methods for migrants? Is there a role for ICT here?
- Under which conditions public authorities fully adopt EU programs ICT innovation

Discussion Points

- We can state that open and participatory processes are able to increase transparency in decision making and political actions at both local, national and EU level, but does this transparency reflect on trust?
- Could a wide involvement of stakeholders and interested parties in the decision making and in the solution design process reshape (or help reshaping) the perception of migrants and refugees in citizenship?
- What are the best practices for representative representation in co-creation processes (involving all citizen groups, including migrants, citizens with diverse backgrounds etc)? What are the best practices for engaging citizens in the full process of providing digital services?
- Co-creation and participatory design are to some extend buzzwords. But what are the requirements for a really taking into account the feedback and inputs from the end-users/migrants and translating their needs into user-centric tools?
- How can ICT development and EU projects in general deal with the uncertainties that come from the strong participation of end-users?
- ICT systems are constantly being further developed, both from a content and a technical perspective. How can we ensure these improvements bring an added value? At which stages of the development of ICT solutions should migrants be involved?
